A Faculty Development Programme was conducted in Mahableshwar on February 13, 2018. Where, Prof. Anand Kumtha conducted an interactive workshop on 'Acting Skills for Teachers'. The Workshop included interesting practical sessions of Role Play and Theatre Games.

2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

The IQAC had a major role to play in the academic year 2017-18 as the college faced the 3rd cycle of NAAC accreditation. The consistent efforts of the college through IQAC towards quality improvement resulted in the college being rewarded with the A+ grade with an impressive CGPA score of 3.59. The details of the significant activities and contributions made by the IQAC are given below.

NAAC PeerTeamVisit:

The IQAC facilitated the NAAC Peer Team visit and made the necessary arrangements for the smooth and effective conduct of the visit. A NAAC Peer Team comprising of Chairman, Prof. Mohd. Iqbal Ali, Former Vice-Chancellor, Satavahana University, Andhra Pradesh; Member, Dr. Anil K. Srivastava, Former Professor of Statistics, University of Lucknow & Director, Institute of Applied Statistics & Quality Management, Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh and Member Coordinator, Prof. A. D. Navalgund, Principal, Anjuman Arts, Science and Commerce College, Bijapur, Karnataka visited the College for the 3rd Cycle Re-accreditation process on September 25 -26, 2017. They visited the various College departments; viewed Power Point presentations; examined the documents; made observations about the infrastructure and had interactions with the faculty, non-teaching staff members, students, alumni and parents. As a result, the College secured an impressive Grade A+ with a CGPA of 3.59 - a remarkable improvement over the 2011 Grade A with a CGPA of 3.13. An added Compliment to the institution is that our CGPA score is among the highest awarded to a Commerce college in Mumbai.

The IQAC also organised a celebration and to mark it a get-together lunch attended by Management representatives, faculty, non-teaching staff, students and alumni was hosted by the Management. Cash incentives to staff members were also gifted by the Management as tokens of appreciation towards the sustained efforts for quality improvement.

Initiatives for Quality Improvement:

Apart from the routine, the measures taken by the IQAC to enhance quality in the institution included the following:

- > Digital preservation of basic service related documents of the staff members.
- > Setting up of a one stop MIS Centre to coordinate and streamline data and information.
- > Setting up procedures for CAS of the teaching staff.
- Creating master lists for basic information required.
- Maintenance of the records/ documents required for the 4th cycle of NAAC.

- > Setting up systems to maintain records/documents required for the 4th cycle of NAAC in keeping with fresh guidelines.
- Extending assistance in preparing the proposal for the UGC Block Grants for the academic year 2018-19.
- > Preparing a Proposal for India Today-AC Nielson Survey for the Best College

Feedback:

Faculty feedback collected from students of all courses and analyzed by a third party was an endeavor towards pedagogic enhancement. The analysis was shared and discussed with the faculty through their Heads of Department and Co-ordinators.

Seminars, Conferences & Workshop

In a breakthrough for the empowerment of women, the College in association with the Maharashtra State Commission for Women set up the Hinduja College Centre of Women Studies on January 19, 2018. This is the only Centre of its type to be registered under the Society Act and to be listed to get support from the UGC to promote Research, Projects and Publications on Women Studies.

On this occasion an International Conference on 'Recent Advances in Women Studies' was also organized. The Conference received 68 papers and had 80 participants from across the City, State and Nigeria.

A delegation, including the Vice Chancellor, of Lakehead University, Canada visited the College campus on March 21, 2018 and interacted with the students and faculty and discussed the possibilities of collaborations, MoUs and faculty and student exchange programmes

Placement of Teachers under Career Advancement Scheme:

2.6 Innovative processes adopted by the institution in Teaching and Learning:

- Classroom Teaching: Use of ICT (Power Point Presentation, Videos, Movies, etc.),
 Written Assignments, Project Presentations, Case-Study Method, Management Games,
 Group Discussions, Debates etc.
- Co-Curricular activities: Intra and Inter College Programmes/Competitions, Arranging Exhibitions, Learning through Documentary, Art and Commercial Cinema, Debates, Group Discussions, Peer Learning, Oral and Poster Presentations are some of the innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the College.

- Students were encouraged to take up Industry-based Projects; National and Local Study Tours are organised and Research-based Projects are assigned to the final year students give them experiential learning to whet their interest in research.
- Guest lectures for the students were conducted by external resource persons to strengthen the teaching-learning process.
- Remedial coaching was provided to the slow learners and intensive coaching and mentoring was given to the advanced learners.
- College organized a grand intercollegiate festival *Panaah* which provided hands-on experience to students in event management, hospitality, public relations, media, marketing and obtaining funds for a mega college event.
- Industrial visits were arranged. Local field visits were also arranged to places like BSE,
 NSE, RBI.
- In specialized programmes such as Bachelors of Mass Media, Bachelors of Management Studies, B. Com. (Accounting Finance), etc. many departments follow new innovative teaching techniques as per their curriculum.
- In an endeavour to enhance the self-confidence of students and to prepare them to face academic and professional challenges, a mentoring system has been established in the College. Details of the system are as follows:
 - Each mentor-teacher is assigned the responsibility of 10 -12 mentee-students.
 - > The mentor breaks down psycho-social barriers and interacts with the mentees whenever the need for mentoring is felt and in any case at least twice a month.
 - > The system is more informal than formal and therefore it is mainly oral communication based.
 - > The mentor guides students who seek guidance in academic, as well as non-academic matters.
 - ➤ Mentors either directly guide mentees with regard to their career development or refer them to the College Career Counselling Cell and Placement Cell.
 - ➤ Quite often the mentor initiates the mentoring activity by counselling diffident and reserved students.
 - > Especial attention is paid to students with special needs to draw them into the mainstream.
 - > Students are helped to select the elective subjects that are best suited for them.

- > When academic irregularities, negative behaviour, aggression etc. are noticed in a student the mentor-teacher touches base with the parents/guardians and/or refers the mentee to the College Counsellor to resolve the problem.
- In case a student desires to have a different mentor-teacher than the one assigned to him, then without any bias or prejudice he is assigned the mentor of his choice.
- > Mentors provide Letters of Recommendation to their mentees who after passing out from the College apply for scholarships or study programmes in a foreign University.

The visible positive results of the mentoring system in the College have been the following:

- An increase in teacher-student contact hours.
- > Development of mutual trust and understanding between teachers and students
- > Enhanced academic performance.
- > Reduced student drop-out rate.
- > Improved time management.

2.12 How does IQAC Contribute/Monitor/Evaluate the Teaching & Learning processes:

- IQAC through Heads of the Departments conducts periodic meetings and reviews the quality of teaching-learning through the Log Book, Lesson Plans, and by reviewing the academic performance of students.
- Lectures of newly recruited faculty are observed by Heads of Departments and some senior faculty at the request of the Principal.
- IQAC collects and analyses the Student feedback about teachers in various criteria and then
 discreetly communicates to the teachers for self-improvement. The Principal and the HoDs give
 inputs to teachers for enhancement of their teaching skills wherever necessary.
- An Annual 'Best Teacher Award' has been instituted and is awarded to teachers on the basis of student feedback collected by the IQAC.
- A rigorous review of the functioning of various departments and committees of the College is
 done regularly as part of the quality enhancement endeavour. This includes meetings at the
 department level, IQAC-department meetings to review teaching-learning processes, meeting

with the Principal and Vice-Principal to oversee and evaluate implementation of reforms and new practices.

3. Research, Consultancy and Extension

3.1 Initiatives of the IQAC in Sensitizing/Promoting Research Climate in the institution

The College is a recognized Research center for the University of Mumbai and offers Research avenues in seven different streams. The faculty is encouraged to avail of the Faculty Improvement Programme of the UGC for pursuing their Ph.D. To guide these research scholars, following research workshops were held in the college by the Research Center:

3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

two-way interactive street performance at Churchgate and CST Railway Stations to create awareness about what should be done to avert such a tragedy.

Saturday Kindness

PANAAH officially announced its first ONLINE PR Activity which was scheduled on November 04, a few days before Children's Day with an obvious focus on children. Students were encouraged to donate clothes, toys, stationery etc. to underprivileged children at places designated as 'Walls of Kindness'. Images of 'Walls of Kindness' were uploaded on social media with the hashtag # Saturday Kindness # Wall of Kindness. Generous donations were received.

Play for a Cause

This year the social commitment of Team PANAAH was Women Empowerment and creating AIDS awareness. A fund raising tournament, the USP of which was the revival of traditional Indian Games such as Kabbadi, Lagori, Human Ludo, etc. was organized on December 01, 2017 at Priyadarshini Park, Nepean Sea Road, Mumbai. Over 2500 college students participated in this event and its proceeds were donated to Navjeevan Centre, an organization that works for victims of human trafficking, AIDS awareness and student welfare.

Gulf Pride Safety Ride

To promote the use of helmets and Road Safety measures and precautions, Team PANAAH organized a Bike Rally with CSR Partner, Gulf Oil on December 09, 2017 in which 250 bikers from different colleges set out for a 1.2 km bike rally. A number of Gender sensitization programs were organized especially under the Women Development Cell.

Orientation Programme

The Women Development Cell organized an Orientation Programme on August 04, 2017. At the programme, Principal Dr. Minu Madlani addressed students about women empowerment and safety; Convener Dr. Gayatri Agarwal gave a gist of the role of the Cell and the activities planned for the year ahead and students, both boys and girls presented a four-part skit on the themes of Eve Teasing and Acid Attacks, Gender Inequality, Domestic Violence and Physical Harassment.

Visit to Asha Daan - An NGO

On August 21, 2017, Convener Dr. Gayatri Agarwal accompanied by WDC Member, Prof. Sarita Mahadik and three student representatives visited Asha Daan, a Home for destitute and disabled people run by Mother Teresa's Sisters of the Missionaries of Charity. The WDC team gave a token of raw food materials, conducted a session with the students there and purchased handicrafts made by special children.

Women's Week Celebrations (January 15 -19, 2018)

The WDC of the College dedicated an entire week to women and womanhood. The week began with the Inaugural Function on January 15, 2018 graced by inspiring women achievers - Dr. Gita Chadha, Director, WDC, University of Mumbai; Advocate Audrey D'mello, Director, Majlis and Ms. Hema Mehta, Asst. Prof., Tolani College, Mumbai. They shared their personal experiences and views, besides information about about the legal and social mechanisms that are available to deal with sexual harassment, domestic violence, feminism, cybercrime etc.

On January 16, 2018, the WDC invited Dr. Sana Merchant, Nutritionist and Dietician to address students on the need and importance of nutrition, especially for adolescent girls. She explained the concept of Body Mass Index (BMI) and taught the students how to calculate it and avert health problems caused because of overweight. Dr. Merchant even responded to queries regarding facial acne, joint pains, weight loss/gain, period disorders etc. that were put forth by the students.

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

College is affiliated to the University of Mumbai so we have to follow curriculum given by the University. We contribute to Curriculum development in the following ways.

- Faculty Members take active part in syllabus restructuring and revision. Some
 faculty members are the members of academic bodies of University of Mumbai
 where they actively participate in curriculum development. Aslo, some faculty
 members are the members of BOS of Autonomous colleges where they participate
 actively in the curriculum development.
- Feedback obtained by Faculty members from students, Peers and Industry are passed on to the Dean Faculty of Commerce / concerned Board of Studies for review and further discussion.
- Faculty members also participate in the various workshops and meets for syllabus restructuring and revision.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- Subject departments conduct meetings at regular intervals of time to formulate their teaching plans, question paper setting and assessment schedules.
- Each faculty is given Log Book which contains details about Teaching Plans, Syllabus completion etc. The same is approved by Heads of Departments and ratified by the Principal at regular intervals of time.
- A subject syllabus completion form is filled and submitted by faculty members at the end of the each semester.

- Students are informed about lecture timings and classrooms and a change in them, if any
 vide Notices.
- Students are encouraged to visit the Library for reference reading.
- Remedial teaching is provided for Slow Learners and special attention is paid to Advanced Learners.
- Students are allowed to access to the Computer Labs for study and research purposes.
- Teachers adopt a Lecture-cum-Discussion method.
- Presentations on subjects are made by students with the help of LCD/Projectors and internet.
- Critiques, Report Writing, Seminars, Quizzes, Debates, Group Discussions, Group Projects, Games and Simulations are used for collaborative learning.
- Students are motivated to use E-learning and Blended Learning through Open Learning initiatives.
- To inculcate critical thinking intra-class debate competitions, group discussions and presentations are arranged. Such activities help to develop logical thinking, communication skills and self-confidence in students.
- Students are given opportunities both to participate in, as well as organize inter-collegiate events.
- The College records and publishes the academic year's activities, with literary contributions from students in three languages [English, Hindi and Marathi] in the college magazine.
- Students are encouraged to become members of, as well as to participate in activities organized by the NSS, NCC, Students' Council, Gymkhana, Rotaract Club, DLLE, WDC and Planning Forum. The activities organized by these committees facilitate the all-round development of students, particularly with regard to team building, resource mobilization and allocation, time management, practical accountancy etc.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- As an affiliate institution of the University of Mumbai, the college follows the examination system set out by the University.
- In the orientation program conducted for F.Y.B.Com. Students a special presentation is made by examination committee to explain CBGS to the students.
- The examination committee of the college prepares the schedule of all the examinations to be conducted during the year in the beginning of the academic session which enables the faculty and students to plan their teaching and learning schedules.
- Question papers set by Faculty are vetted by HOD's of respective Department to ensure that they adhere to standards.
- Revaluation and moderation of the examination papers are done as per the University rules and regulations.
- The students are sensitized well in advance on the consequences of using unfair means.
- Answer papers are masked to ensure unbiased assessment.
- Assessment is centralized as per the University rules.
- Meeting of the students with poor performance was conducted with their parents. They were counselled about improving their performance. They were provided with previous years question papers. They had to solve and submit the same. There was improvement in the subsequent examination result.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- Library and ICT facilities are made available to all students (U.G., Post graduate, M. Phil and Ph. D students) and faculty members.
- Talks by eminent personalities are arranged to foster a scientific temper and develop an aptitude for research culture among students including M.Phil., and Ph.D. scholars.
- Guides are allocated to the under-graduate students for undertaking Research Projects.
- Research related Workshops, Seminars and Conferences are organised on a regular basis.
- Duty leave is sanctioned to support staff for undertaking research activities and also registration fees along with TA is provided to the staff participating in National and International Conferences / Seminars.
- A three-day cost free Workshop on 'Basic Research' was organized by the Centre from December 19 - 21, 2017 to provide training to scholars pursuing their Doctoral and Predoctoral degrees in various Research Centres in Mumbai.
- Dr. Neeraj Kaushik from the National Institute of Technology (NIT), Kurukshetra, Haryana, a renowned name in the field of academic research and well-known for his research technique videos on the 'YouTube' guided 30 participants on various research related topics like Types of Research, Data and Variables (DV, IDV, Moderator, Mediator) Formulation of Objectives, Hypothesis and Model FormulationThe Importance of Control Variable Metric and Nonmetric Measurement Pathway to Bi-variate Analysis, Parametric and Non-parametric Tests, R Language, Regression V/s ANOVA etc.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- The College has an intranet facility within the campus. Vriddhi Library Software is being used for maintenance of the Library. All functions such as Data Entry (Books, Journals and Membership), Transaction (Issue, Return, Renewal and Fine Collection), Generation of various Reports are computerised. Digital Library is maintained with software to upload and upgrade the various e-resources (Books, Journals, database). Faculty, staff and students make use of the computers which have been provided in the Library to browse for books. Also sufficient computers are available for data entry and transactions.
- Special printers are available for generation of barcode labels as well as for general purpose use. Intranet and Internet facilities are available for the users. Wi-Fi is made available in the entire College
- E-Journals and E-Books were made available to the faculty and students.
- Our library has software India Stats and INFLIBNET.
- The library has also installed OHP Projector and User Scanner facility for students and teachers.
- Tally ERP software is used for accounting purpose.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- Orientation and training programs are periodically organized for new recruits.
- In order to enhance capacities of the Faculty various Faculty development programs are arranged on regular basis.
- Recreation programs are also organized for Faculty, non-teaching and supportive staff.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

- The college is affiliated to the University of Mumbai and enjoys minority status. The faculty is recruited through the duly constituted Selection Committee as per University norms. This comprises of the nominees of the Management, University and Director of Higher Education. The Vice-Chancellor nominates the Subject Experts.
- The vacant post(s) of the faculty is / are widely advertised and applications are invited. The Principal and the concerned Head of the Department carry out the scrutiny of the applications and candidates with higher merit are called for an interview before the Selection Committee. Proceedings of the Selection committee are sent to the University for the Vice-Chancellor's approval. After getting the approval of the Vice-Chancellor, faculty is appointed on probation for one year.

 - TEDx Hinduja College 2017 is a licensed, independent event from the International Non-profit Media Organization TED. It is driven by the motto 'Ideas Worth Spreading' and it focusses on spreading unique ideas in the areas of Technology, Entertainment, Design, and Human Interest stories that are relevant to the local community that can make a substantial impact for a better society. TEDx Hinduja College was registered as a part of the Global Media Network in 2017 and started with its initiative to bring change and impact. The TEDx Hinduja College event was held on September 23, 2017 at Marathi Sahitya Sangh auditorium. The event incorporated 120 students who worked under 14 departments which included Curation, Marketing, Hospitality, Event Administration, Production etc.

It not only gave students an international exposure, but also exposed them to a network of professionals and change-makers in society. Students were actively involved in Debates, Conceptualization, Management, and extensive Brainstorming to bring out the best of ideas. It is to be noted that nothing was outsourced in the event and it was completely handled and managed by students under the able guidance of faculty members.

The event invited 14 distinguished speakers and performers who addressed a range of subjects such as Career Choices, Equality, Education, Bollywood, Art and Culture, Women Empowerment, Fitness and Physical Disabilities.

 - Encouraging staff members to take various research projects (Minor & Major)
 - Inspiring faculty members to register for doctorate / Ph. D degree & motivating the registered students to soon submit their thesis.
 - ➤ Organising Seminar / Conference / Workshops at National & International Level for promoting research in the college.
- Special Library Sessions were organized for students to encourage them to access library facilities
- To encourage the students to participate and excel in sports and cultural activities.
- Continue to organise Dharam Hinduja Essay Writing Competition at all India Level.







BEST PRACTICES NO.1: 2017-18

Title of the Practice:

WOMEN DEVELOPMENT CELL

Goal:

The Women Development Cell functions with the following specific goals

- > To create awareness about the rights of the women and problems of women in general and particularly with regard to gender discrimination.
- > To provide a forum for dialogue, discussion, and deliberation on women's rights and gender-related issues.
- > To create a safe environment for girls and to sensitize students, teaching and non-teaching staff about gender issues through academic and cultural activities.
- > To prevent and deter the commission of any act of harassment, including sexual harassment and to provide the procedure for resolution, settlement, or prosecution of acts of sexual harassment by taking all required steps.
- > To encourage participation of NGOs and law enforcement agencies in this area.

The Context:

Education is the biggest field to introduce any massive change in the society. With the spreading of awareness about gender discrimination at all levels, we find many self-sustaining movements by young leaders of colleges. Legal measures have also made their ways into colleges and other institutions. One of them is Women Development Cell. Women Development Cell plays an important role in voicing opinions on important matters that affect the daily life of women students. They provide a platform where students can comfortably participate and share opinions and views. They actively promote gender equality.

The College Women Development Cell (CWDC) is a statutory body constituted under the Vice Chancellor's Directives to promote general well-being of female students, teaching and non-teaching female staff. The WDC in our institution tries to go beyond the minimum essential requirements and the technicalities and tries to work for the women development in a real sense.

The Practice:

The main objective behind this program was to make women development a reality. To implement the above plan, the following actions were initiated by the college:

- In a breakthrough for the empowerment of women, the College in association with the Maharashtra State Commission for Women set up the Hinduja College Centre of Women Studies on January 19, 2018. This is the only Centre of its type to be registered under the Society Act and to be listed to get support from the UGC to promote Research, Projects and Publications on Women Studies.
- 2. A series of activities like Orientation Program, Field Visits, Women's Week, Workshops, Activities for students as well as teaching and non-teaching staff were organised where eminent successful personalities from the different fields visited the college.

Evidence of Success:

The success of the proactive Women Development Cell is evident from the number and the quality of programs organized as follows:

Orientation Programme

A skit based on 'Women Empowerment' was performed by the students of the Women Development Cell. The primary objectives of this skit were to create awareness about the provision of the Act and to sensitize the audience about the issues related to women in every stage of life. During the skit the students highlighted sections of various laws available for protection of women. The skit was divided into four parts. The first part was based on 'Eve-Teasing and acid attack'. The second part was based on 'Gender inequality'. The third part was based on 'Domestic Violence' followed by 'Physical harassment'.

Inauguration Ceremony of Womens' Week, January 15, 2018

Women Development Cell of K.P.B Hinduja College of Commerce has organised Women's Week from January 15 – January 19, 2018. The objective of Women's week was to create awareness and to promote general well – being of female students, teaching and non – teaching women staff of the College. The esteemed guest for the ceremony was Dr. Gita Chadha, Director, WDC, University of Mumbai; Advocate Audrey D'mello – Director, Majlis and Ms. Hema Mehta, Assistant Prof., Tolani College of Commerce. The various issues related to women were addressed to gathering by these experts such as the mechanism to deal with sexual harassment, domestic violence, feminism, cyber crimes etc.

Dr. Gita Chadha expressed her views on feminism. She explained feminism as a movement that seeks to achieve equality and social rights for women in all key areas which include education, personal, economic, employment, and cultural sphere of human endeavors. This movement has also campaigned for the protection of the girl child and women from sexual harassment, rape and violence within the home. Our next guest for the inauguration ceremony Advocate Audrey D'mello insisted that women should raise voice against domestic violence. She talked about her NGO – Majlis, a Mumbai based legal centre that addresses issues of gender and human rights,

provides quality legal services to women and children and impart skills of feminist lawyering through training and internships. Our next Guest of Honour Ms. Hema Mehta shared her personal experience of struggle and achieving success in life.

Lecture on 'Nutrition and Women', January 16, 2018

Dr. Sana Merchant, Nutritionist and Dietician explained the importance of nutrition in adolescent girls. Adolescent girls are particularly vulnerable to malnutrition because they are growing faster than at any time after their first year of life. They need protein, iron, and other micronutrients to support the adolescent growth spurt and meet the body's increased demand for iron during menstruation. She explained the concept and taught the students how to calculate Body Mass Index (BMI). BMI measurement is the calculation of the body weight in relation to the height and is commonly used as an indicator whether one might be in a risk category for health problems caused by weight.

A lot of queries were addressed of female students related to irregular menstrual cycle, facial acne, pain in joint, weight loss and individual queries were solved with nutritional advice by Dr. Sana Merchant depending upon the condition mentioned.

A lot of positive feedback was also observed and attentive behaviour of the student while the session of health was being conducted.

Lecture on Special needs for Women Students, January 17, 2018

Dr. Asha Ambani, Counselor, emphasized on the special need for women students as girls and boys are different biologically and hormonally and chromosome wise and reproductive role also is different in them. Biological needs are diet and nutrition, physical exercises, sleep, hygiene, dressing style and medical attention related to menstrual cycle, anemia, HPV vaccine, emotional disorders and awareness about female circumcision. Awareness about social anxiety starts right from birth. Factors which cause social anxiety are gender bias, difficulty in mobility, media and social media and lack of education.

To overcome and stand against social anxiety women have to become psychologically strong. Factors which deplete psychological energy are inferiority complex; some are self-imposed, family problems, fear of failure, physical handicap, not good looking or hormonal problems like PMT (premenstrual tension) & thyroid problem.

Be aware of addiction and LGBT community which can have effect on child bearing carrier in future.

Activities for Students, January 17, 2018

Women Development Cell has organized Essay writing, Poster making and Presentation Competition for Students on January 17, 2018.

The essay writing competition was organized to enhance their thinking ability and problem – solving skills, which is important for our nation. The students were asked to write an essay on any women related issues.

The Poster making competition was organized for the following topics:

- 1. Women in 21st Century
- 2. Save a Girl Child
- 3. Stop Violence against Women

The Presentation competition was organized for the following topics:

- 1. Representation of Women in Media
- 2. Legal Rights for Women in India
- 3. Cyber Space and Women
- 4. Women Empowerment: Myth or Realty

Workshop on Self Defense Techniques, January 18, 2018

Self Defense programme was organised for female students by Swastik Pitale so that they can trust themselves and take appropriate action in potentially dangerous situation. Self defense helps to prepare one for unexpected situations and also develops increased mental and physical health.

Activities for Teaching and Non Teaching Staff

Different types of games such as Quiz, Find the pairs, Roll the Dice were arranged for teaching staff. Teachers love the activities performed and the fun games hosted by Women Development Cell.

Title of the Practice:

Social Service Sensitization Programme

Goal:

Service Oriented Programmes unites the academic and voluntary community service to make studies immediate and relevant. The objectives of the Service Oriented Programmes at Hinduja College are:

- To engage institution of higher education in issues of their communities
- To address and meet social needs
- To help students identify and understand cultural differences
- To enhance critical thinking
- To train young leaders.
- To enliven academic disciplines
- To develop useful skills, etc.

The Context:

A primary role of education is to equip people with the knowledge and confidence to make a difference in the transformation of society. In addition to providing students with content knowledge, education helps instill values, attitudes and behaviors that align with those expected in a society. Hinduja College believes in overall development of students and helps them to socialise by indulging them in various curricular, co-curricular, and extra-curricular activities, which has distinct objective to achieve towards the betterment of the society.

Educational institutions happen to be the centers of human resource development and the learners who come out of these centers are expected to go the society and take up some responsibility. Socially responsible students with ethical and morale values will become good and socially responsible citizen and good citizen will ultimately give good service to the society. Thus, the colleges and the society are interrelated and interdependent.

Every department of the college and every convener of the different courses and committees set their programme by aiming to sensitize students about diverse issues of social, personal, national and global concern.

The units under Service Oriented Programmes are NSS, PANAAH, Rotaract Club, etc.

Evidence of Success:

Following activities reflecting Institutional Social Responsibility and extension have been conducted during the year through various committees like NSS, Panaah, DLLE, etc.

NSS:

The NSS Unit of the College had an action and activity packed academic year as follows:

- NSS activities in the academic year commenced on June 11 with a Painting Drive organized at Bandra Railway Station to beautify the station walls and to create awareness about animal protection and care.

Students were encouraged to donate clothes, toys, stationery etc. to underprivileged children at places designated as 'Walls of Kindness'. Images of 'Walls of Kindness' were uploaded on social media with the hashtag # Saturday Kindness # Wall of Kindness. Generous donations were received.

Play for a Cause

This year the social commitment of Team PANAAH was Women Empowerment and creating AIDS awareness. A fund raising tournament, the USP of which was the revival of

traditional Indian Games such as Kabbadi, Lagori, Human Ludo, etc. was organized on December 01, 2017 at Priyadarshini Park, Nepean Sea Road, Mumbai.
